

Give away a way!

A year ago I invited us to consider the question "What is Cursillo?". At a meeting last November, Revd Hugh Burgess, British Anglican Cursillo's National Spiritual Director, asked that same question but in a particularly thought provoking way. When a fellow lift traveller overhears you mention the word or spots your badge and asks what Cursillo is, how do you answer?

You haven't got long, so be brief and keep it simple, simple enough that it trips off the tongue without having to look anything up or dig deep into your memory!

The irony is that for many of us we might prefer to say what it isn't. It's not a secret society. It's not a separatist movement, sect, clique or denomination. It's not an exclusive membership club. It's not Spanish! I'm sure you could add more.

But what is it - in a nutshell? Try this in the lift: "Cursillo is a way of building strong Christian discipleship in local churches"? It's easy to remember and your fellow traveller now knows it's for Christians, within their church, not away from it, and it's about method not membership. Like a pilgrimage, it's about a journey, a way of travelling.

If you've got a few more floors to go before parting, your companion may want to know more about this 'way'. You could say "It helps Christians to develop their relationship with Christ and to keep growing in prayer, study and action." "How?" he or she asks. "People are invited to meet in small groups, seek spiritual direction, adopt a rule of life and participate in a three day course on Christian Living."

So what's so special about Cursillo? Surely it's the way we do small groups and a three day course. It's the simple tried and tested 'agenda' we have for each of these elements.

And now for a challenge! Have we traditionally seen our way of "building discipleship" as being mainly about getting people to participate in the three day course, with the small groups as an important follow up? Surely that restricts our contribution to only those for whom three days away is both possible and appealing. But small groups, modelled on our Group Reunion 'way', cost no money and little time, can happen at any time and in any place, and require no organising apart from agreeing when and where to meet. They can provide a source of growth for everyone. They can be our gift to every church.

And that is the challenge Hugh Burgess has set us: to make our 'way' of small group meetings available in *every church in the land*.

No secret - give it away. Give away our 'way'.

'WITHOUT A VISION...'

It's interesting that the Cursillo weekend begins with the theme 'Ideal'. This can be a hard notion to dig into for people, since it seems, at first sight, to be so far removed from how people commonly think about their lives. Money—yes; health-yes; autonomy-yes; happiness—yes. But ideal? Yet we're right to place 'ideal' front and centre as we think about the



renewal of discipleship, be it at a weekend or at any other time. The Old Testament prophet once declared, 'Without a vision the people perish!' That's what lies beneath our concern with 'ideal': that God puts before us a vision, God's idea of the fullness of humanity. That ideal comes to us in Jesus of Nazareth. He shows us the Way, gives us his Life, shares his Truth. Indeed, he is the Way, the Truth and the Life, and for that very reason he's our Ideal too. In fact, the Cursillo method describes the Ideal in somewhat less straightforward terms, but it comes to the same thing: faith and grace both have their source in Jesus Christ. It's important for us to grasp, though, that he's both the source and the end ('Alpha and Omega He', as we sing at Christmas). As the Ideal, Jesus Christ is both behind us as the source for the life we live, and also ahead of us as the goal of the life we live. Paul described Jesus crucified and risen as expressing 'the full stature' of our humanity. There we come closest to what the Cursillo method means when it speaks of 'Ideal'. For disciples, the ideal is living into the full stature of our humanity trusting in the company of Jesus (faith), and with the tools given to us by the Holy Spirit (grace).

People do indeed perish without a vision. Maybe our world isn't void of vision. But is there a brighter, clearer, better vision than the one that, like a Day-star, shines over all humanity and through all of human history from the first rays of Easter morning? That's the Ideal to which—to whom—we're committed, and to which we progress day by day:

Really I would like to tell my story backwards, relating how my life is now, with just a few little pointers to past events showing how my wonderful God brought me to this place. But that wouldn't do justice to the grace, mercy and blessings he has poured out on me and those I love, and for which I am so thankful.

Sometimes things happen and we're not sure why. They may have a sense of rightness about them but we remain perplexed as to their meaning or function.

For example, how could I have understood at the time what it meant that I became moved to the point of tears whenever I would read my bible?

Sometimes we may have a conviction to do something which we can't explain at the time. We may do it over many years, and it may cost us money.

For example, how could I have understood why I felt compelled to keep going to French classes all these years, when my husband, after a bad work experience there, said he would never return to France?

Sometimes something will happen which shocks or surprises us, and we wonder, what on earth's going on?

For example, how could I have understood why I fell on my front during a Christian gathering? It was an isolated incident and set me thinking for a long while.

Sometimes we may live with a person for many many years and think we know everything about them, but then one day they will turn around and give us the surprise of our life.

And that is what my husband did one weekend in March

I found myself, with David, in a small town in France with a group of missionaries. Perhaps given the examples above you have an idea of how I came to be there, although you may be wondering how I persuaded David to come. All I can say is that God must have had a hand in it.

On that Saturday, David and I sat at a picnic table facing a church pastor and a missionary. What I thought was to be a fun picnic lunch turned out to be an interview.

I answered my questions as best I could (in very imperfect French) and then the pastor turned his focus on my husband, who isn't a regular church goer. The pastor asked David about me, my life, my faith and the things that are important to me. He was unwavering in his responses and had obviously prepared for this event. I had to hold back tears as he spoke.

At the end I was told that although only single people or married couples would normally be accepted, there was a place for me on the mission team if I wanted it.

I accepted gladly, with David's blessing. I would be travelling out to France as often as family, money and work commitments permitted.

The story of my Cursillo Fourth Day is one of how God has shown His love and care, and his plan for me, in very tangible ways. To Him be Praise and Glory.

But there is another story, my husband's story, and how God is working in his life in a private and gentle way. And witnessing God working His purpose out in David's life is the most exciting thing of all for me.
